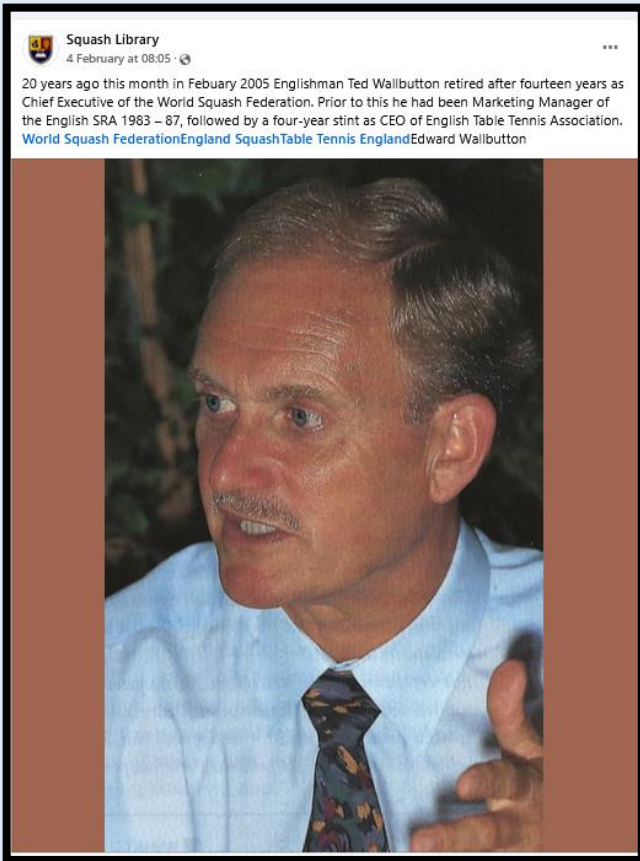

After discussions that had started at the beginning of 2014, on 18 December 2014 PSA announced that they and the Women's (WISPA, then WSA) Tour would merge from January 2015 so that the professional ranks of squash would be administered by one unified governing body.

Continuing to operate under the existing PSA name, the re-formed organisation was to be responsible for running the men's and women's professional game with the strategic aims of increasing the level of equality and parity in prize money and playing opportunities across the sport. 

In 1987 (when the men's PSA was ISPA, and WSF was ISRF), Roger Eady was the Executive Director for both. ISRF AGM motions from England & Germany suggested that the ISRF should be managed by a person with no other roles i.e. he shouldn't share the role. Another German motion wanted ISRF to manage a pro-circuit with its own rankings. All were withdrawn, but soon after Eady did choose one and went with ISPA.

**ISPA-ISRIF accord under threat — Davenport warns:**

## DON'T ROCK THE BOAT!

STUART DAVENPORT, ISPA Chairman, has pledged the Association's full and continued support for the working partnership between ISPA and the ISRF, but in a letter to all ISRF members national has warned that the players will go their own way if certain motions put forward by England and Germany at this month's ISRF annual meeting are approved.

The motion that would be considered are:

1. That Roger Eady, ISPA's executive director, should be the sole employee of the ISRF instead of the shared basis as at present.
2. That the ISRF should be responsible for the administration of the professional squash circuit and the official world rankings.
3. That tournaments needing assistance in obtaining assistance in obtaining requests to the appropriate national association.

Says Davenport: "The ISPA Board are extremely concerned about the implications for international professional squash should these motions be passed."

"If Roger Eady is not allowed to continue working for us it will effectively mean the end of personal time operation between the ISRF and ISPA. And that is very much to be avoided. present arrangement will take us back to the days of no-must and that we simply cannot afford it."

On the question of circuit administration and rankings, Davenport has this to say: "An interest in the ISRF recognises the ISPA and WSPA rankings as the official ones for men and women players, and it has been the partnership between the two bodies that has produced a co-ordinated and regular international circuit."

"Let me make one thing absolutely clear: The ISPA will continue to produce its own circuit, even if the ISRF set up in opposition. We would never revert to a professional and amateur circuit."

It furthermore, ISPA would be unable to participate in the circuit if the ISRF through its various directing committees of a split task plan."

Davenport in his letter also states ISPA's view that the Association reserves the right to select the most competent referees for the circuit.

VISITS BY ISPA members to South America have, until recently, been confined to the occasional invitation tournaments and exhibition matches.

All this has changed however with the start some 1000 members of the first 're-organised' series of ISPA' invited series, beginning in Rio de Janeiro, followed by the Uruguay Open, the Buenos Aires Open, the Paraguay Open, and the Lima with the Peru Open.

ISPA vice-president Cerry Jones visited the circuit and was able to report that many of the problems of organisation and communication are being overcome — mainly due to the tireless efforts of Peter Kingston, who acted as overall co-ordinator for the events in Argentina, Paraguay and Uruguay, aided by Enrique Chaves, Director of the Club Chubbini (President of the Argentine Squash Federation).

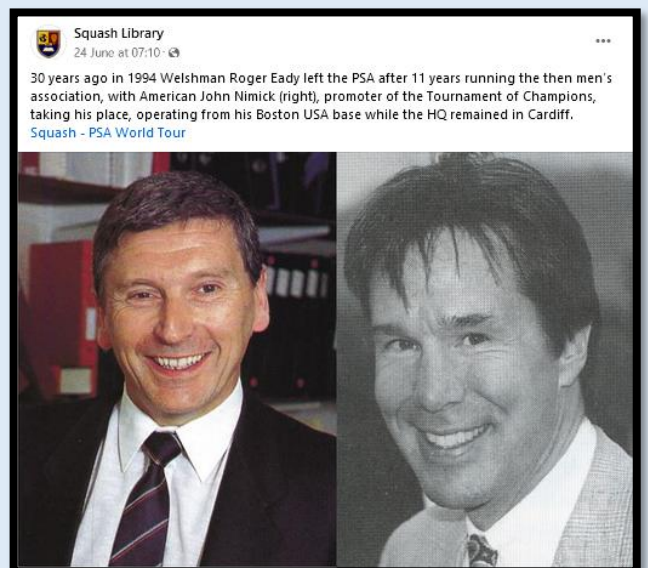
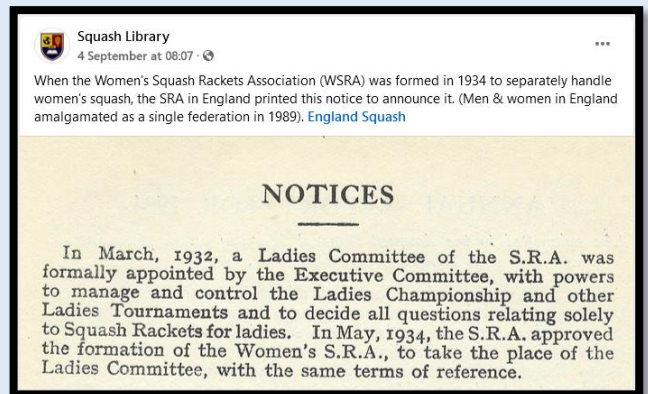
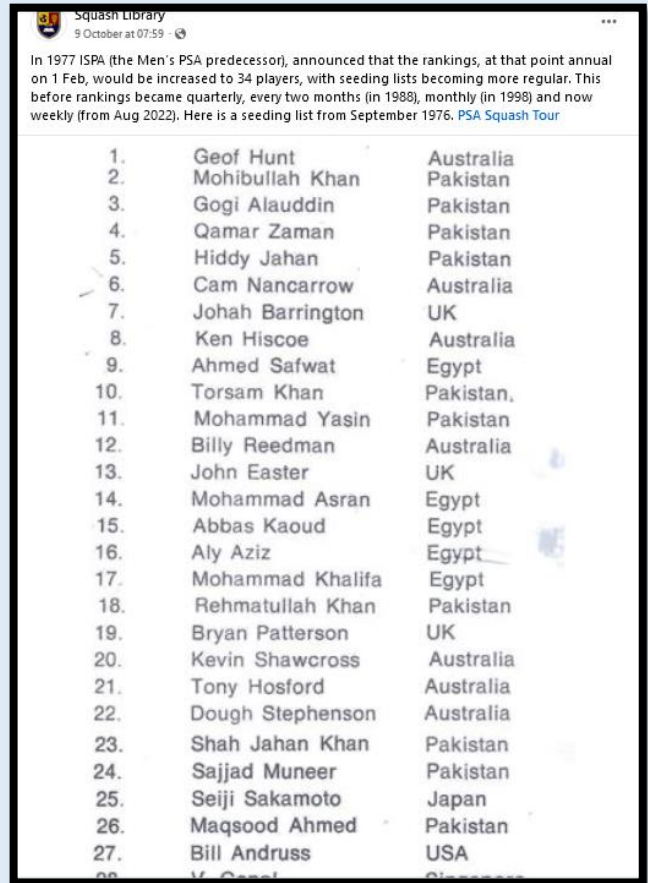
Difficulties were only experienced in Peru and Brazil where there is no national body dealing with ISPA and the local promoters.





## The World Squash Federation What it is and what it does

**WSF MISSION**  
The World Governing Body for Squash the WSF's mission is to keep the sport growing and maintain its quality and reputation as one of the most exciting and enjoyable participant and spectator sports in the world.

**SQUASH AND THE WORLD SQUASH FEDERATION**  
Squash was first played over 100 years ago and is now played in over 130 nations. The International Squash Rackets Federation was formed in 1967 to promote and co-ordinate the sport, its name being changed in 1992 to the World Squash Federation (WSF). The WSF is recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as the International Federation for Squash. It is a member of the General Association of International Sports Federations (GAISF) and the Association of IOC-Recognised International Sports Federations (ARISF), the President of which is a WSF Vice-President.

**MEMBERSHIP OF THE WSF**  
The WSF has 105 Members, all of which are National Associations of Squash, recognised by their National Olympic Association or Ministry of Sport. Member nations are required to be in membership of one of the five Regional Squash Federations, which are an integral part of the WSF structure.

**MANAGEMENT OF THE WSF**  
The WSF is controlled by a Management Committee responsible for the day-to-day work of the Federation. The Committee is elected by Member Nations and consists of a President and three Vice-Presidents, who serve two year terms of office. An Executive Committee, consisting of Management Committee plus one Regional Vice-President appointed by each of the five Regional Federations, assists the Management Committee in strategy and policy making processes. The WSF publishes a 64 page

**WORLD SQUASH CALENDAR**  
The Federation works closely with the two player associations, the Professional Squash Association and the Women's Squash Players Association, to coordinate the world Squash calendar. World Circuit events are held in all major nations and are integrated with the World Championships to ensure that there are no clashes of dates.


**WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS**  
The WSF is responsible for organising and promoting World Championships for men, women, boys, girls and masters and team level and in singles and doubles. World Team Championships of each type are held every two years, with the World Championships for Senior Men and Women also being held. World Championships are hosted by WSF member nations and events four years in advance.

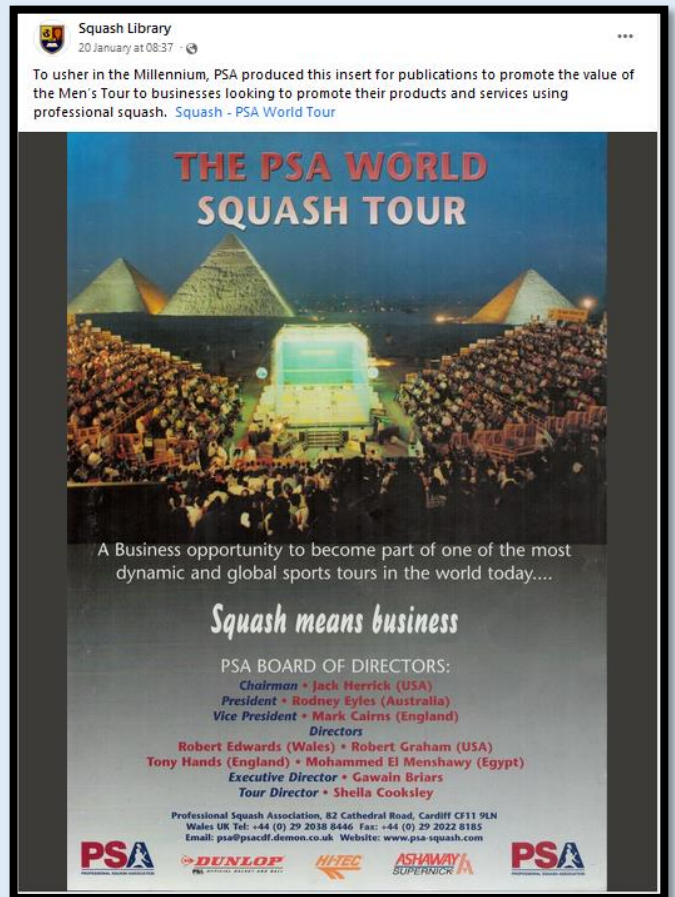
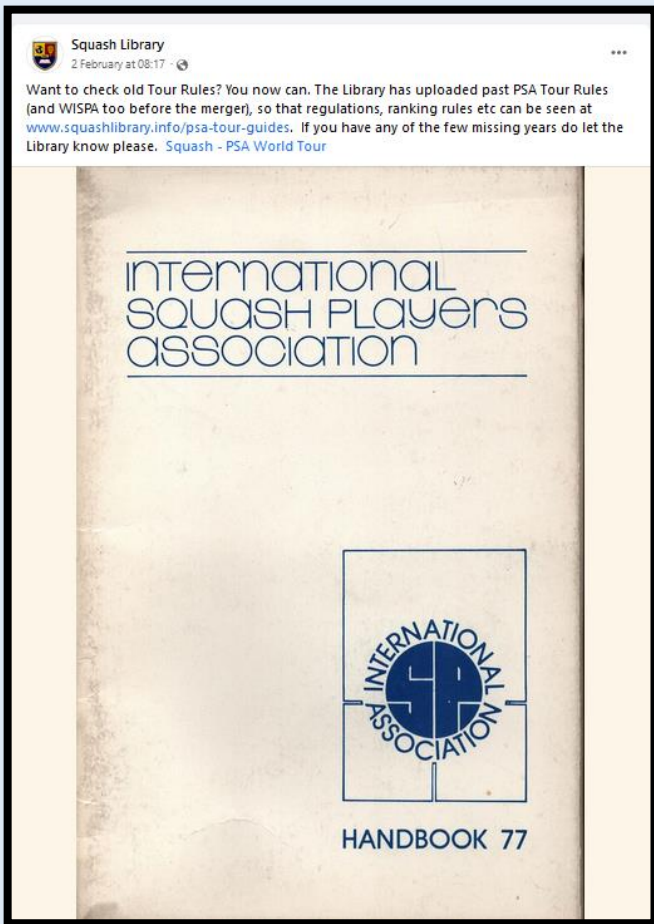
**COACHING**  
The WSF is responsible for coordinating the program of training and accreditation by member nations and the comparison of qualifications. The Federation appoints Consultant Coaches whose prime role is to undertake projects within member associations.

**DEVELOPMENT**  
One of the most important of all the functions undertaken by the WSF is the development of Squash, not only in countries where it is not yet established but also where it is already established. Advice on all matters is given to member nations and implemented by specialists recommended by the WSF.

### WPSA/ISPA Merger Update

Extensive discussions between the WPSA and the International Squash Players Association (ISPA) continue to move the professional players' association closer to a merger.

The result of WPSA Executive Director John Ninnick's three-day trip to London and Cardiff, Wales, home of the ISPA, was the first draft constitution for an integrated world body.

Comprehensive evaluation by the WPSA Board of Directors of the proposed new constitution, an amalgamation of the WPSA By-laws and the current ISPA Constitution, and the creation of a binding Letter of Agreement are the next steps to be taken by the WPSA. The working title of the new global sanctioning and players organization is the Professional Squash Association (PSA).

Although the working title and several key financial points are not completely settled at this time, progress has been made on the majority of merger issues. As ISPA Executive Director Roger Eady points out, "We are very eager to effect this merger. North America has tremendous growth potential for professional and recreational squash. The WPSA has proven its expertise in promoting both events and a successful circuit and organizing and manufacturing Teaching Pro's. Now that soft ball is gaining in popularity so rapidly in the U.S., having the cooperation and services of the WPSA and its resources can only be a significant gain for the world game."

The security of the hard ball game is an obvious issue in the merger discussions. Agreement has already been reached by the two associations to include

hand ball doubles and singles rankings in the published "world" rankings. In addition, 25 per cent of all qualifying spots in all draws will be open to "non-ranked" players. Particularly in doubles, crossover will be encouraged and expected.

The promise of the merger continues to be predicated on a two-year political and financial moratorium preserving significant WPSA decision-making autonomy. WPSA Board and membership voting rights will retain primary authority over the internal business and policies of the North American PSA division until December 31, 1994. At that time, the World Board will have the authority over all aspects of PSA business.

The World Board will be constituted by four (4) elected member representatives, voted on by all PSA members worldwide, the PSA Executive Director, currently Roger Eady, and two (2) North American representatives nominated from within the North American Advisory Board.

The current plan to proceed on the merger involves a July 12 WPSA Board Meeting to review the PSA Constitution and Letter of Agreement, and an August 7 Annual General Meeting to seek membership ratification. The AGM is tentatively scheduled for 3:30 p.m. on the Friday at the Loews New York Hotel in New York City. Elections for committee members and the Executive Slate will take place at that time.

It is necessary for the WPSA to have twenty (20) voting members at the AGM to effect a voting quorum. The Association is planning a full day of subsidized activity around the August 7

AGM. Tentatively, golf and tennis are being planned for the Apawamis Club in the morning and a cocktail/dinner party (guests invited) at some hip NY spot after the meeting. (Quick, someone call Rick Walshbird.) The WPSA is planning to offset the costs of some of this activity; details to follow. Hopefully, this day will be enjoyable and memorable.

Please continue to communicate with Rob Hill, Jack Herrick, the Board, John Ninnick, Suzanne Magee and all others involved, with your thoughts and suggestions. We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible on August 7 for the confirmation of these plans.

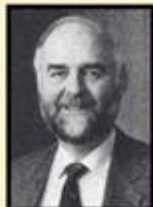



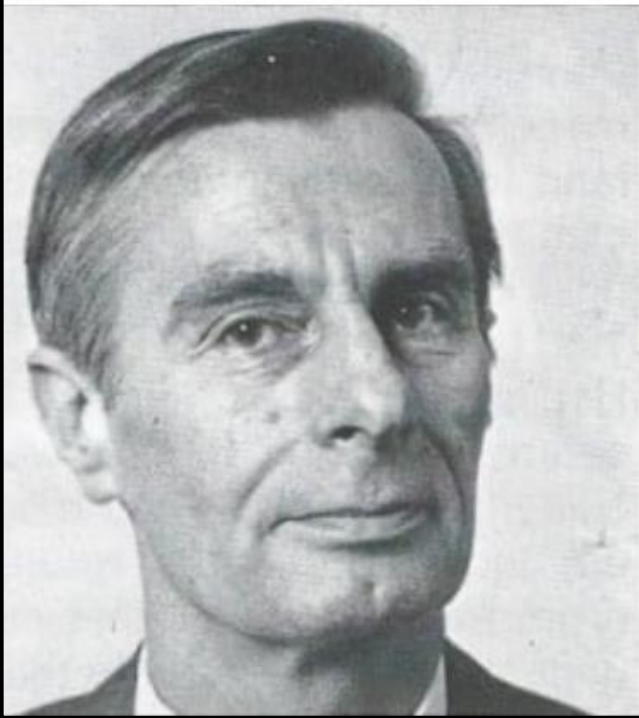

The Squash Federation of Africa (SFA) was formed in August 1992, covering the African continent and the Indian Ocean islands. Founder members were Egypt, Kenya, Namibia, Nigeria, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Since then a further 13 African nations have joined. The first President was Egyptian Mahmoud Barakat.

The strength of member Egypt can be seen by that nation in 2012 achieving an historic milestone in holding all four World Team titles for the first time, while the enduring strength of World Federation Founder member South Africa's squash can be seen from their hosting six World Championships, including three Masters events. The Pan American Federation of Squash (FPS) was created on 18 November 1989, in Houston, Texas - with the backing of the squash federations of 22 countries within the American Continents.

Under FPS auspices squash participation in the Pan American Games has continued since 1995, and the Federation has 28 members. Brazil, Canada, Cayman Islands, Ecuador & USA have already hosted World Championships.

The Asian Squash Federation was formed at the suggestion of Pakistan, and the First Meeting of Squash Playing Nations of Asia was held in Karachi on 29 November 1980.

Pakistan were invited to nominate the first President, who was Air Chief Marshal M. Anwar Shamim.

The Founder Members were Bahrain, Bangladesh, Malaysia, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand. Currently based in Hong Kong since David Mui (below) took over the presidency in 2013, it has 28 member nations from across the continent.

The region has produced individual World Champions Jahangir Khan & Jansher Khan from Pakistan, and Malaysian Nicol David, along with world junior winners too.

When Jahangir Khan became President of the World Squash Federation in 2002 at the Kuala Lumpur AGM, the Pakistani 'legend' became the first and to date only professional player to take the role. The 6 times World Open and 10 times British Open Champion became a WSF Vice-President in 1998. He served the maximum two terms before stepping down in 2008 to become and remain WSF Emeritus President. (Five times Australian World Champion Sarah Fitz-Gerald is a current WSF Vice-President). When the Federation was formed in 1967 it had a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Honorary Treasurer, Executive Secretary and a 5th officer (a representative of a member nation).

In 1987 a motion was passed changing from this to President and 2 Vice Presidents\* + Secretary / Treasurer. Following this, in 1991, the number of VPs was expanded to three\*. Two years later the Secretary / Treasurer position was dropped. (\*Both genders required)

The number of VPs increased from 3 to 4 at the WSF AGM in 2016.

At the WSF AGM yesterday, a motion to increase the number of its VPs from four to five was not passed, so 4 VPs is unaltered. [World Squash Federation](#)

In 1986 the ISRF (now WSF) and ISPA (now PSA) jointly formed the MISTC (Men's International Squash Tournament Council). It had four primary aims:

1. To develop and co-ordinate the Men's World Calendar
2. To plan and develop a World Grand Prix Circuit for men's squash
3. To issue regular Grand Prix bonus points / latest status reports
4. To arrange contracts with Men's Grand Prix sponsors.

While the Circuit was formed with points published, the search for Grand Prix partners / sponsors didn't succeed, and by 1989 the partnership was disbanded.

In February 1986 the International Olympic Committee (IOC) granted official recognition to the ISRF (now WSF) – thus admitting squash into the Olympic movement. At that point the hope was that squash could try to become a demonstration sport for the Olympic Games in 1992 (Barcelona).

This was not possible for Barcelona, nor Atlanta 1996 or, most disappointingly, Sydney 2000, after which the demonstration sport option was discontinued by IOC. [World Squash Federation](#)

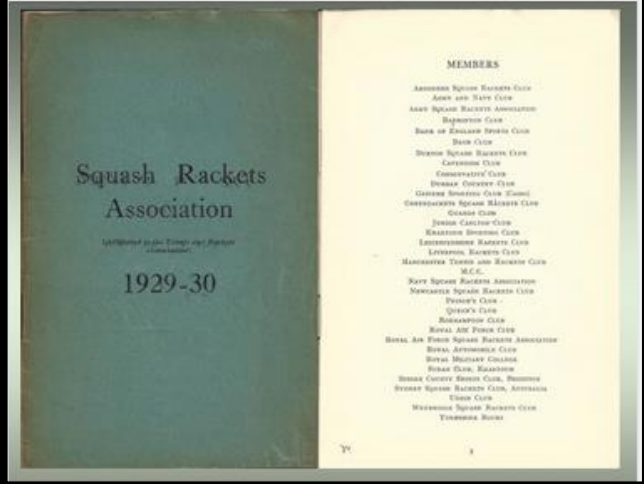

45 years ago today, on 13 June 1975, the ISRF (now WSF) elected in New Zealander Murray Day as the 2nd President – after Englishman Peter Phillips (1967 – 1975). Fellow Kiwis John Taylor and Mike Sumpter were elected a Vice President and Executive Secretary respectively. Raul de Villafranca from Mexico was the other elected Vice president. Squash first became 'managed' internationally when the Royal Automobile Club (RAC) set up its own squash committee to run squash at the Club - it first met on 19th June 1912. Then the Tennis & Rackets Association appointed a squash sub-committee to look after squash's growth, dealing with Rules, specifications etc. It became too much for them to deal with so the English Squash Rackets Association (SRA) came into being in December 1928. They coordinated the sport until The International Squash Rackets Federation (now WSF) was formed in January 1967. Here is the 1929 list of SRA member clubs, a selection including armed forces and overseas including Cairo, Sydney and no less than two from Khartoum, Sudan.



The inaugural AGM of the ISRF (International Squash Rackets Federation, now WSF), took place in London on 5 January 1967. The sport of squash had been led by the British Squash Association from its formation in 1928 until this point.

The seven nations represented were Australia, United Arab Republic (Egypt), Great Britain, India, New Zealand, Pakistan & South Africa.

Englishman Peter Phillips (pic) became the first Chairman – neatly linking the start of ISRF with the beginning of the sport at Harrow school where he was educated! Amongst other items initially dealt with, a constitution was agreed, the Rules in force were adopted, and an initial annual subscription of GB£100 decided.

Arrangements were also made to initiate and manage World Championships.

The issue of USA not being able to join due to not subscribing to one of the main objects of the Federation – upholding the Rules of Squash – due to the variation primarily played there, was overcome by inviting USA & Canada to become Associate members. This was soon upgraded and involvement / championship participation became possible. [World Squash Federation](#)

In Perth, Australia at the Women's World Open in 1983 a player gathering decided that the women should follow the men and institute a player body. At the Belfast Boat Club, N Ireland the following year – 26 February '84 to be exact – the first general meeting of what became called Women's International Squash players Association (WISPA) was held. New Zealander Robyn Blackwood (left) was elected as Chairwoman and Australia's Rae Anderson (right) as Secretary/Treasurer. The Women's Association merged with the Men's (PSA) in January 2015. 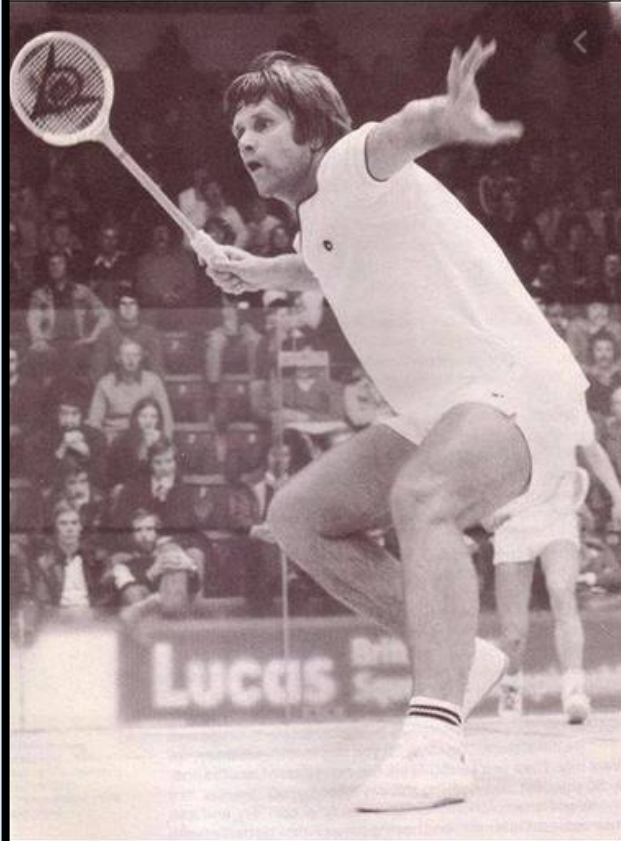

In March 1974 international male players decided to form a player association. Unhappy with the seedings produced for the Prodorite Open in Birmingham along with other issues, the players met at the event and International Squash Players Professional Association (ISPPA) was born. The 'professional' was almost immediately dropped when a constitution followed, and the name became ISPA until changing to PSA in 1993. Australian Ken Hiscoe (pic), who had withdrawn from the Prodorite in protest at the seedings, was appointed President, Jonah Barrington became Chairman and Geoff Hunt Vice President.

To be eligible for membership, players would need to have played in three open tournaments in the preceding 12 months.

Minutes of 1st General Meeting of the Women's International Squash Players  
Group held February 26th, 1984 at Belfast Boat Club - 10.00 a.m.

Present:

Rae Anderson, Robyn Blackwood, Gail Clarke, Sue Cooper, Susan Dewey, Sonia Gwynn, Liz Irving, Martina La Motte, Jan Miller, Lisa O'Neil, Tracy Smith, Sally Taylor, Rhonda Thomas.

General aims of the Association were outlined, as in the constitution, and it was decided to go ahead and officially form a women's I.S.P.A. Association.

The constitution was discussed and proposed by Susan Dewey to be accepted subject to final approval and amended by Sue Cooper - accepted unanimously.

A name was discussed and the matter was deferred to later in the meeting.

Election of Officers for the Executive Committee:

President - Robyn Blackwood.

Secretary/Treasurer - Rae Anderson.

Committee elected by ballot:

Sue Cooper, Rhonda Thomas, Heather Wallace.

[Gail Clarke went to toilet].

Deputations (1) to the Executive.

An entrance fee and subscription was discussed and it was unanimously decided that the fee for 1984/85 should be set at:

Entrance Fee - \$40 or £20.

Annual Subscription - \$80 or £30.

This is on top of the Foundation Membership fee of \$20 paid by new members players and 2 partners.

The name of the association was again discussed - WISPA, ISPA, WPSA, WPA, WISA, WISA were all considered. Agreement was difficult and WPSA was later adopted subject to confirmation at the E.C.M. to be held at the British Open.

The meeting finished at 12.30 p.m. and the Executive Committee then met.
