In March, 1932, a Ladies Committee of the S.R.A. was formally appointed by the Executive Committee, with powers to manage and control the Ladies Championship and other Ladies Tournaments and to decide all questions relating solely to Squash Rackets for ladies. In May, 1934, the S.R.A. approved the formation of the Women's S.R.A., to take the place of the Ladies Committee, with the same terms of reference.

On 3 July 2017 Professional Squash Association (PSA) and World Squash Federation (WSF) signed a Memorandum of Understanding intended to see the two bodies work in unison towards achieving a joint vision for the future of Squash on a global scale. The published intention central to the partnership featuring 20 priorities was the development of a global strategy, focusing on objectives such as, securing a place on the Olympic Games programme; maintaining squash's presence on other international multi-sport games programmes; growing participation levels around the world; and encouraging the development of court facilities in conjunction with centres, local associations and national federations.



On 1 January 1993 ISPA (Men's Tour) merged with WPSA (the professional Hardball player body in North America) to form PSA, thus combining their memberships. While Hardball singles had not continued, the success of Hardball Doubles prize funding led to it splitting away in 2000, with the formation of the International Squash Doubles Association (ISDA). Englishman John Horry was a key person in international squash for over 50 years, starting in 1928 when he saw the future King Edward VIII playing in Nairobi. Managing the English Association from 1955, the de facto world authority it was natural that he should become the first secretary of the World Federation when it was formed in 1967.



Ten years ago Dutchman Lou Zandvliet, credited as the founder of the European Squash Federation, passed away at the age of 84. An international player, Zandvliet had the idea of forming a group of European countries to compete against each other and to promote the welfare of Squash, within Europe.

The European Squash Rackets Federation was founded on 17th April 1973, organised by a team of honorary officers and Lou Zandvliet was, from the start, one of the elected vice-chairmen. And following Lennart lepsen's (Sweden) term of office as Chairman at the beginning until 1977, Lou Zandvliet was his natural successor. He presided until 1985.

In 2004 a landmark joint World Squash Anti-Doping Code was signed between the World Federation (WSF) and the Men's & Women's Pro Tours (then PSA & WISPA). The three associations published a common code in their regulations so that testing and penalty procedures became jointly administered. At that time the Director General of WADA, the World Anti-Doping Agency, stated "Squash has set an example of how professional organisations and leagues can work hand-in-hand with an International Federation to use the Code as the basis for the fight against doping in sport. It is an example we at WADA would encourage all professional organisations and leagues around the world to follow." 

The Squash Federation of Africa (SFA) was formed in August 1992, covering the African continent and the Indian Ocean islands. Founder members were Egypt, Kenya, Namibia, Nigeria, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Since then a further 13 African nations have joined. The first President was Egyptian Mahmoud Barakat.

The strength of member Egypt can be seen by that nation in 2012 achieving an historic milestone in holding all four World Team titles for the first time, while the enduring strength of World Federation Founder member South Africa's squash can be seen from their hosting six World Championships, including three Masters events. Namibia, have also been World event hosts, the 2014 World Juniors. World Squash Federation

The Pan American Federation of Squash (FPS) was created on 18 November 1989, in Houston, Texas - with the backing of the squash federations of 22 countries within the American Continents.

The first President was Juan Carlos Barvo from Colombia and it was in his country in 1991 that the first Pan American tournament was organized in Medellin, Colombia.

Under FPS auspices squash participation in the Pan American Games has continued since 1995, and the Federation has 28 members. Brazil, Canada, Cayman Islands, Ecuador & USA have already hosted World Championships.

It was 1992 when the Oceania Squash Federation (OSF) was formed and began coordinating events in the region, including introducing Oceania Championships. Founder members were Cook Islands, Fiji, New Caledonia, Papua New Guinea and Samoa, along with Australia and New Zealand. Vanuatu joined in 2010 and Tahiti in 2014. Eligibility for the Oceania Squash Championships is restricted to member countries and players eligible to compete in the (South) Pacific Games & (South) Pacific Mini Games, e.g. Cook Islands, Fiji, New Caledonia, PNG and Samoa; so Australia & New Zealand do not participate.

The first OSF President was Murray Day (NZL) (below), who had been 2nd World Federation President (1975 – 1981). World Squash Federation

The Asian Squash Federation was formed at the suggestion of Pakistan, and the First Meeting of Squash Playing Nations of Asia was held in Karachi on 29 November 1980.

Pakistan were invited to nominate the first President, who was Air Chief Marshal M. Anwar Shamim.

The Founder Members were Bahrain, Bangladesh, Malaysia, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand. Currently based in Hong Kong since David Mui (below) took over the presidency in 2013, it has 28 member nations from across the continent.

The region has produced individual World Champions Jahangir Khan & Jansher Khan from Pakistan, and Malaysian Nicol David, along with world junior winners too.

Nine Asian nations have staged 45 world squash championships between them. World Squash Federation

When the Federation was formed in 1967 it had a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Honorary Treasurer, Executive Secretary and a 5th officer (a representative of a member nation).

In 1987 a motion was passed changing from this to President and 2 Vice Presidents* + Secretary / Treasurer. Following this, in 1991, the number of VPs was expanded to three*. Two years later the Secretary / Treasurer position was dropped. (*Both genders required)

The number of VPs increased from 3 to 4 at the WSF AGM in 2016. At the WSF AGM yesterday, a motion to increase the number of its VPs from four to five was not passed, so 4 VPs is unaltered. World Squash Federation

In 1986 the ISRF (now WSF) and ISPA (now PSA) jointly formed the MISTC (Men's International Squash Tournament Council). It had four primary aims:

- 1. To develop and co-ordinate the Men's World Calendar
- 2. To plan and develop a World Grand Prix Circuit for men's squash
- 3. To issue regular Grand Prix bonus points / latest status reports
- 4. To arrange contracts with Men's Grand Prix sponsors.

While the Circuit was formed with points published, the search for Grand Prix partners / sponsors didn't succeed, and by 1989 the partnership was disbanded.



In February 1986 the International Olympic Committee (IOC) granted official recognition to the ISRF (now WSF) – thus admitting squash into the Olympic movement. At that point the hope was that squash could try to become a demonstration sport for the Olympic Games in 1992 (Barcelona).

This was not possible for Barcelona, nor Atlanta 1996 or, most disappointingly, Sydney 2000, after which the demonstration sport option was discontinued by IOC. World Squash Federation

45 years ago today, on 13 June 1975, the ISRF (now WSF) elected in New Zealander Murray Day as the 2nd President – after Englishman Peter Phillips (1967 – 1975). Fellow Kiwis John Taylor and Mike Sumpter were elected a Vice President and Executive Secretary respectively. Raul de Villafranca from Mexico was the other elected Vice president. The inaugural AGM of the ISRF (International Squash Rackets Federation, now WSF), took place in London on 5 January 1967. The sport of squash had been led by the British Squash Association from its' formation in 1928 until this point.

The seven nations represented were Australia, United Arab Republic (Egypt), Great Britain, India, New Zealand, Pakistan & South Africa.

Englishman Peter Phillips (pic) became the first Chairman – neatly linking the start of ISRF with the beginning of the sport at Harrow school where he was educated! Amongst other items initially dealt with, a constitution was agreed, the Rules in force were adopted, and an initial annual subscription of GB£100 decided.


Arrangements were also made to initiate and manage World Championships.

The issue of USA not being able to join due to not subscribing to one of the main objects of the Federation – upholding the Rules of Squash – due to the variation primarily played there, was overcome by inviting USA & Canada to become Associate members. This was soon upgraded and involvement / championship participation became possible. World Squash Federation





Squash first became 'managed' internationally when the Royal Automobile Club (RAC) set up its own squash committee to run squash at the Club - it first met on 19th June 1912. Then the Tennis & Rackets Association appointed a squash sub-committee to look after squash's growth, dealing with Rules, specifications etc. It became too much for them to deal with so the English Squash Rackets Association (SRA) came into being in December 1928. They coordinated the sport until The International Squash Rackets Federation (now WSF) was formed in January 1967. Here is the 1929 list of SRA member clubs, a selection including armed forces and overseas including Cairo, Sydney and no less than two from Khartoum, Sudan.





In 1996 WISPA Board members attending the WSF AGM showed up wearing men's shirts and ties, and with moustaches affixed! 

In Perth, Australia at the Women's World Open in 1983 a player gathering decided that the women should follow the men and institute a player body. At the Belfast Boat Club, N Ireland the following year – 26 February '84 to be exact – the first general meeting of what became called Women's International Squash players Association (WISPA) was held. New Zealander Robyn Blackwood (Ieft) was elected as Chairwoman and Australia's Rae Anderson (right) as Secretary/Treasurer. The Women's Association merged with the Men's (PSA) in January 2015. 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In March 1974 international male players decided to form a player association. Unhappy with the seedings produced for the Prodorite Open in Birmingham along with other issues, the players met at the event and International Squash Players Professional Association (ISPPA) was born. The 'professional' was almost immediately dropped when a constitution followed, and the name became ISPA until changing to PSA in 1993. Australian Ken Hiscoe (pic), who had withdrawn from the Prodorite in protest at the seedings, was appointed President, Jonah Barrington became Chairman and Geoff Hunt Vice President.

To be eligible for membership, players would need to have played in three open tournaments in the preceding 12 months.
