

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Asked how they prepared 70 years ago in 1954, these two British Amateur champions said this: Alan Fairbairn (left), when asked how he had trained to defend his championship title stated that he gave up smoking and drinking spirits on 1st November (weeks before the event). He did no running and relied on his squash matches, which averaged nearly three a week to keep him fit. He did not go especially early to bed.

Roy Wilson (right), said that the year before he trained up to the hilt and was convinced that this was worth quite four points and game to his opponent! Accordingly he did no special training the next year, and no running. He cut out drinking spirits but drank beer and especially Guinness. He did not smoke cigarettes and cut out cigars but allowed himself an occasional pipe. His one "must" was early to bed - 10-12 hours of sleep every night. England Squash































Today's post is only peripherally about squash, the link being that Peter McRae played for England; just once in 1937. It recounts the heroic act that ended his life during World War 2. He was serving on HMS Mahratta in the Arctic when the ship was sunk by a German U-boat.



McRae and 17 others scrambled onto a small float.

Realising that it was overcrowded, he apparently remarked 'There's not enough room for us all' and slipped off the float into the sea to his death. The postscript is that the rest of the sailors were rescued.

Playing squash for England was an achievement, but nothing compared with what he managed in his utterly selfless death.












Before the SRA was formed in England in 1928 and became the de-facto world body until the ISRF arrived in 1967, the RAC in London was the unofficial squash authority after forming a squash sub-committee in June 1912 (as shown here). The first meeting was exactly 111 years ago today on 19th June 1912.

In 1981 Bert Armstrong completed building a squash court next to the kitchen in his Melbourne home. This coincided with the first graphite rackets appearing, and so friends left wooden ones behind when he played them - prompting him to hang them round the court. Then he started adding club badges, banners, flags, balls; anything that had a Squash / Racket sports connection. An obsession with collecting was beginning.

As he put it, 'From then on I visited every Charity shop, Municipal Tip, Antique Fair from Hobart Tasmania to Cairns in far North Queensland, and similarly the UK, and even scoured a market in Kirkenes Norway.

So about 35 years later he has 1000+ rackets from 120 manufacturers in 23 countries plus many badges, books, flags, trophies, documents etc.





















Tomorrow, this year's World Squash Day takes place globally. Stemming from the death of so many people, including Derek Sword a former Scottish junior squash international, in the 9/11 terrorist attack in 2001, the first was held on 11 January 2002 at Lambs Club in London. It featured an 8-man pro event alongside a 15-a-side match between teams from London and New York to remember those lost and support the game. Here are a number of players from that first event. World Squash Day









The retirement of Roger Federer prompts the memory that in 2013 the tennis star backed squash to be added to the Olympic Games programme in 2020.

"I think it's a wonderful sport. It's unfortunate some sports don't get the opportunity to be in the Olympics," said Federer. "I think squash would deserve it. They run a great tour and they have great players and characters. I'd personally be very happy for them."

Meeting up with then women's squash world No1 Nicol David at the ABN AMRO World Tennis Tournament in Rotterdam, Federer expressed his support to David and revealed he played the sport growing up.

"I used to play it a lot when I was younger every Sunday with my dad," Federer said. "I started with a wooden racket like I did in tennis. I've always been a big fan of the sport." World Squash Federation Squash – PSA World Tourlikico David





In 1999 the uncertainty about the staging of the British Open was swept away via an 8 year deal with Eye Group, a sports rights acquisition and production company. The deal lasted for that year in Aberdeen as well as the next two years before it collapsed with legal action being taken by England Squash against Eye and their sister company Fablon in 2002.

But not before Eye / Fablon agreed other 8 year agreements with PSA and WISPA to inject many millions over 8 years into the Men's & Women's Tours, together with a WSF accord too. All three organisations were involved in the Melbourne Festival 2001 which was to feature the Men's & Women's World Opens, Men's Team Championships and World Masters events. The non-payment of the underwriting commitment led to PSA cancelling the Men's World Open, while funding had been secured in advance to provide a Women's prize pot so that it went ahead, as did the other elements. The Australian organisers incurred substantial losses

When American John Skillman wrote his book 'Squash Racquets' in 1937 he speculated about glass squash courts, over four decades before they began to be produced. Here is the section: US COLUMBLE.



I often have thought how fine it would be if we could have glass squash courts. At every exhibition match I have watched, even those in which I have played, the spectators were shoving each other and stepping on each other's toes in order to get an occasional glimpse of the players. Some even resorted to getting high step-ladders, so that they might look over the crowd and see a little of the play. This lack of gallery space is indeed a great handicap to the game, for many people who now do not play would want to learn the game if they saw how much real enjoyment players of all degrees of skill get from it. Those who are already interested in the game are anxious to watch good players in action in order to learn things that would better their own games.


Recently I discussed the possibility of building glass courts with a man well acquainted with many glass products on the market today. He thought the idea a good one and quite practical. I have no doubt that within a short time glass courts of the type that I am going to describe will be built. I feel that an investment in courts of this kind would prove profitable to any club interested in increasing interest in squash racquets.

The glass court I have in mind would have its two side walls and its back wall of glass. The inside of the court would be white, and would have the same reaction on the wall as the wood court. There would be no sliding effect, as one might fear. It would be possible for spectators to look in and see all the actions of the players, but the players would not be able to see out. If they could see out the court would be worthless, as the crowd would annoy the players so badly that good squash would be impossible. These glass sides and back could be made every bit as strong as any wood backing. This is hard to believe but it is true. Get ready to play in glass courts in the future and prepare yourself for a great treat.



When Charles Read wrote his book 'Squash Rackets' in 1929,he encouraged women to play saying, 'Squash Rackets is a game which should appeal to every lady who wishes to keep fit, to retain a youthful figure and to remain supple and comely for years beyond the general alloted span of such attributes'.

Mind you, he did also observe this about females 'Her back is more flexible and weaker than a man's back; it is apt to become tired more quickly, and it may wobble and spoil the direction of a high shot if too much power is put into the stroke'. A view from nearly a century ago!






The WSF launched its Ambassador Programme in 2011 with a visit to Riga, Latvia. It was the first of a decade of the WSF international promotional initiative taking leading squash players, together with an international coach and referee, into younger squash nations to help raise the sport's profile - through clinics, exhibition matches, refereeing and coaching seminars, and media presentations.

After Latvia the African countries of Malawi and Namibia followed, then Panama and Venezuela in 2013, Papua New Guinea in 2014, before focussing on the Balkan region in 2015 with appearances in Serbia, Romania and Croatia. In 2016, the team visited Dalian and Macau in China. After the 2017 edition was postponed, the Ambassadors went to Armenia and Ukraine in 2018, and Nairobi, Kenya in 2019. Playing squash, tennis and badminton is the best way to reduce the risk of suddenly dying, a study published in 2016 found (https://bjsm.bmj.com/content/51/10/812). The racket sports reduce the risk of death by 47 per cent compared to doing nothing, researchers discovered based on 11 annual health surveys for England and Scotland from between 1994 and 2008.

The study, which looked at the impact of different sports on health of people with an average age of 51, discovered that taking part in running and jogging, or football and rugby did not have a significant effect on cutting the chance of death. British Journal of Sports Medicine (BJSM)

In 2003, Boston's SquashBusters became the first US urban program to open its own youth center in coordination with Northeastern University. Two years later when the American National Urban Squash and Education Association was launched in 2005, it featured four member programs serving a total of 250 students in Boston, New York and Philadelphia. It now has 19 member organizations across the country and five affiliates abroad, with more




Leo Au, from Hong Kong, broke the record for the longest professional squash match ever recorded en-route to claiming the ninth PSA World Tour title of his career at the Holtrand Gas City Pro-Am in January 2015 in Canada.

His dramatic semi-final victory was the longest match ever recorded a mammoth 170-minute encounter (11-6, 4-11, 11-6, 7-11, 16-14) against Canadian Shawn Delierre.

It was a match that eclipsed the previous record set by legendary Pakistani six-time world champion Jahangir Khan, who took 166minutes to get past Gamal Awad in the 1983 Chichester Festival 9-10, 9-5, 9-7, 9-2. Yes, in four games!

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








As squash events moved from glass-backs to all-round viewing there was a brief stage where buildable glass back courts were used. The first major event to do this was the March 1980 British Open, with final rounds played on the stage of the Wembley Conference Centre. (After that year the event moved away before returning in 1984 with a showcourt with seating all found it).

Promoter Mike Palmer of Multisquash needed to show what this new staging concept would look like. In his words, 'To give the media – and the public – a greater understanding of what was happening, I commissioned a commercial artist to produce an illustration. This was then photographed and photos sent out with press releases'.

This picture is an example of 'squash art', as opposed to cartoons and the like. If there are others out there the Library would love to create a gallery of them so that they can be viewed and preserved.









Seventy years ago, in 1951 this report on the state of doubles appeared in a British magazine, indicating that there was only one 'larger' court available. It was a few decades before moveable side wall courts added more on demand to the few permanent ones.

B EFORE the war the doubles game was rapidly increasing in popularity and several doubles events were built in the London area. Unfortunately, bombs and other causes have exterminated every doubles court in England, leaving only the doubles court at the Edinburgh Squash Club where devotees of this type of game can continue to play.

In the past few years, there has been growing up an increasing tendency for those who find the singles game too strenuous, to play the doubles game in the ordinary standard singles court. Those who have played the game for some time have evolved the technique by which the players give way to each other so that each player has plenty of room in which to play his shot and collisions between players are surprisingly infrequent.

Although the game is not yet officially recognised by the S.R.A., doubles competitions have started and a tournament has been successfully held at the Worthing Squash Club for the past two seasons.



In 1909, Hugo F Charteris (later Lord Elcho) wrote this while posted as an attaché to the British Ambassador in Washington:

'Squash Rackets is the great game in American country houses. It is the most brutal smashing form of sport in which I have ever indulged. It is squash tennis, really, as they use tennis rackets and covered tennis balls. It is impossible to miss the ball, as it as big as the racket with which you hit it, and it goes on bouncing for a good long time in a small four sided court with no ledges or steps to add to the variety or uncertainty of the game. You hit as hard as you can till you become exhausted and miss it.'





Commentators at the Wimbledon tennis this week have regularly talked of 'squash shots' being played. Meanwhile Australian tennis legend Rod Laver once said of his career that he was never without a squash ball in his pocket to help strengthen his wrist!





Shadow training / star bursts, where a player replicates movement from tee to corner and back without a ball has been a feature of training regimes for generations. But in 1986 an attempt was made to automate it with a device that would call out a random set of corners to avoid predictability.

Enter 'Shadow Caller'. An electronics firm in England developed a unit that would be placed at the back of the court and emit four different tones at intervals – each indicating a different corner. Intervals and tones were adjustable. It was sold for GB£90.

Perhaps the absence of follow up advertising indicated low interest at a high price.









After the first squash-specific courts arrived at Harrow School near London in 1865 (see https://www.squashlibrary.info/features for details), a past-pupil constructed what is thought to be the first court in a house. Augustus George Vernon Harcourt (pic), a scientist, did this at his Oxford home in 1883.

His son Simon (one of 10 children – an unbalanced 8 girls and 2 boys!) recounted 'As soon as they could walk the children were taught the game. It must have been between 1980 and 1895 that my brother-in-law, the famous war correspondent, Sir William Beach Thomas who ran for Oxford, C B Fry, TB Case and many others used to come along and play with us'











While the SRA in England were still managing the sport internationally (the World Federation began in 1967), they introduced a ball levy so that a proportion of the sales price would come to them as support funding. Hence the ball price rise to 171/2p (approx. €0.191/2 / \$0.22).

INCREASE IN PRICE OF THE SQUASH BALL

The increase in the recommended retail price of a squash ball from 3s. to 3s. 6d. from the 1st July, 1965, has come about as the result of a request made by the Squash Rackets Association to the Federation of British Manufacturers of Sports and Games Ltd.

to the Federation of British Manufacturers of Sports and Games Ltd.

In recent years, the rapid increase of international commitments, in a game in which spectators are necessarily so few, has resulted in a very severe strain on the S.R.A's finances, and the repeated, and unsatisfactory recourse to appeals for money from clubs and individuals. The S.R.A. felt that the players in this country would not object to paying an increased price for a ball, if they realised that it was money that was being put back into the game, and was being solely used to maintain our position in international squash, and as the overall governing body. With the game developing so rapidly throughout the world, our S.R.A. is competing with overseas associations, which derive financial assistance from their own sources, and to maintain our leadership in the international federation, which will no doubt shortly come into being, our finances must be on a sounder basis. This levy will, it is hoped, help to do this, and a proportion will go to the Women's S.R.A. to assist them with their international commitments. It must, therefore, be clearly understood, in fairness to the manufacturers and distributors of squash balls in the U.K., that this increase has been made at the request of, and solely for the benefit of, the S.R.A. and W.S.R.A., and is in no way a normal trade increase. The manufacturers are taking no profit whatever from this, and do not at present foresee the need to put up the price further. In view of the fact that the price of the ball has remained stable for so many years, it is hoped that this increase will be accepted without criticism by players in this country, in whose interests it is being made.






In October 1932 Mr K.C. Gandar Dower, a leading English tennis and squash player of his day (and aviator, explorer and author too!), set out predictions for the future of squash in a magazine article. Now, 88 years later, here is an extract for interest: "What of the future? We must remember that squash is still in his infancy, somewhere about where lawn tennis was in 1900. By 1940 let us hope that players will have reached a degree of accuracy so great that they can really kill the ball, or else, as is much more probable, matches will be lasting somewhere around three hours. By 1970 ... athletes will drug themselves scientifically and make their one great bid for the championship and totter home and die. And I shall come puffing into the auditorium and take my place among 5,000 people and watch the final reflected in the vast mirror in the roof".

International Player registration began for squash when WSF introduced it in January 2014. Called SPIN (Squash Personal Identification Number), it was formulated along the lines of other regulated sports that already had player, coach, official licences. The intention was to deal with official coordination and player international event entry, seeding, draw and results seamlessly, handle eligibility, uniform name spelling, discipline and anti-doping considerations. 
In 1935 an Englishman, Eric Hyde, wrote a book entitled How to Play Squash Rackets. In addition to his coaching tips (the illustration shows a rather erect half volley pose), he covers preparation and ladies squash.

On preparing he says this about smoking, '.... none at all on the day of a match, until about half an hour before the match starts, when a cigarette will steady the nerves'. Definitely not a recommendation any more.

He also comments on women's squash saying, 'Usually a woman is quicker and lighter on her feet than a man.... But she is liable to tire quickly with injudicious running about'.

Hyde also explains, '... one other important difference between the sexes in playing games is a temperamental one. Most women play a dashing type of game which produces a brilliant shot one stroke and very often a weak one the next it is definitely not the way to win matches consistently.

The library reports, it does not endorse historical comments!

Do we play squash with a racket or racquet? Generally speaking it has been a racquet in USA, and a racket elsewhere worldwide. In America a 'racket' can be used as a term for unscrupulous activities!

In the late 1300s British author Geoffrey Chaucer used the term racket & later William Shakespeare did too, referring to tennis e.g. King Henry V says 'When we have match'd our rackets to these balls'.

Other famous writers from where the sport originated in UK have used racket, including Johnson, Swift, Thackeray and Dickens.

Perhaps it is best left that either spelling is understood, wherever it is written!





It was in 1978 that one of the first squash computer programmes was developed - by the Victorian Association in Australia. Reacting to the growth of squash and time taken to process results, it was intended to cover areas we have taken for granted for many years

At the time the uses were stated to included: (a) weekly match results, (b) Ladders, (c) Performance lists, (d) Registration lists (e) Club registration (f) remote output using data transmission from country areas.

Then, it was claimed that squash was a sport that was an early recogniser of the value of computers to sport.

World Squash Day was born in the aftermath of the 11 September 2001 World Trade Centre attack in New York. Former Scottish squash junior international Derek Sword was one of the many fatalities, and WSD founder Alan Thatcher along with Sword's friend Laurie Maclachlan decided this would be a fitting tribute, while doing something positive for the sport.

A few months later on 11 January 2002 the inaugural event was an eight player challenge tournament at Lambs Club in London. including stars Peter Nicol, John White and Paul Price (logos 2002 – 2004 below).

The occasion also marked the first 15 a side London-New York Challenge match for the Derek Sword Trophy donated by Derek's friends and colleagues at Keefe Bruyette Woods in New York.

With more than 50 events taking place around the world in 20 different countries, it was the start of the annual worldwide Day used to develop and promote squash.

In keeping with the Library archive role, as it is April Fools Day here is an article on postal squash from The English Federation magazine 27 years ago, just before the internet began. (Mea culpa!). Now time for a new version? Web Squash?

My three wall boast got lost in the post

"SURELY he can't have volleyed," I thought as I retrieved the familiar looking postcard that had come to rest, snuggled neatly between the final gas demand and a card from the library insisting that three books had been required back many moons ago. Ignoring the ever-mounting library fine, I turned over Peter's card to find that he had indeed played a sharp volley deep into the forehand court.

Here we were well into the fifth game of our Postal Squash match and he was still taking the ball early. One could only marvel at the stamina of an opponent after eight months' exhausting play. Still, a good response now and my trump card - a same-day couriered card no less - would see me at match ball.

You may not have encountered Postal Squash since there are currently only two players, but stand by for what may become the new sporting phenomenon of the 1990s. Don't be surprised if it sounds the death knell for scores of squash clubs, as participants switch from the frantic energy sapping version they currently play in the sweat boxes of the nation.

What is postal squash? Quite simply, it is a derivation of postal chess in which each player sends his opponent the next shot in a rally which continues until a point is won.

I cannot yet reveal the rules and general details of postal squash, as my patent application has yet to be granted. Obviously I must wait until I can do so without fear that it might be copied before royalties can be agreed. However, I am conceited enough to believe that I might be doing for the development of sport what Mr. Waddington has done for board games. And I'm not overly worried about the reaction from those who say the whole element of exercise has gone. I can simply point to the virtual elimination of any risk of injury, which must surely be to everybody's benefit.


I am prepared to say that in principle a player wins a point if the opponent incorrectly anticipates a shot when cards cross in the post. Or when his return doesn't arrive within a stipulated deadline. Of course, the requirement for quick delivery if points are not to be squandered generally means short matches in England where the Post Office continue to mount strikes or simply lose letters within their sorting system for days and weeks! It is only a personal observation, but mail is definitely more likely to go astray if it has a short distance to travel. Address it to the other side of the country and it will unerringly arrive the next day if it has been sent second class and three days later if posted first class, but don't hold out too much hope if you are corresponding within the same town!

But I digress. Readers will appreciate that postal squash cannot operate effectively without use of a third party who will receive and log all shots. It is he or she who adjudicates on lets and strokes, ensures players do not take more than the one week head allowed between games and

COULD YOU PLAY FOR IRELAND?

The Irish S.R.A. is trying to form a panel of British based players who are eligible to play for Ireland, Ireland has been the weakest of the four home countries for many years and the Association feels that there are many good players who live and play their squash in England who do not realise that they are qualified to play for Ireland. The differences between the county and international qualifications are that whereas the residential qualification for international teams is three years instead of one, an international qualification may be obtained if a player's father was born in the country. Therefore any first-class player whose father had been born in either Eire or Northern Ireland is qualified to play for Ireland and the Irish S.R.A., the Fitzwilliam Lawn Tennis Club, Wilton Place, Dublin 2, would like to hear from him.



In 1987 research carried out for a London, England commercial radio station, Capital Radio, come up with the impressive stat that 1 in every 20 men aged 15 to 34 from London played squash at weekends. When all ages were combined the proportion dropped to 1 in 50 – which still placed squash as twice as popular as golf, and on a level with tennis.





As far back as the 1920's Guinness advertised their beer as having health benefits.
